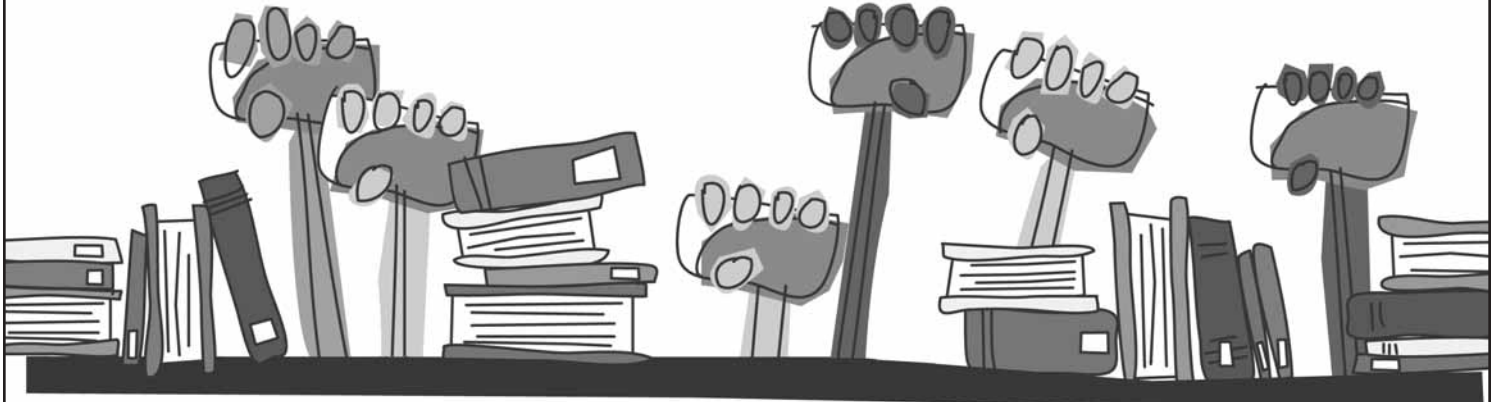

Message from the City Librarian

Anticipation gave way to jubilation this summer as the Ottawa Public Library celebrated the opening of the spectacular Greenboro District Library while hosting the very successful Canadian Library Association (CLA) Conference and Trade Show in June.

We welcomed 1,150 delegates from across Canada, the U.S.A. and the U.K. to our beautiful city while celebrating the OPL's 100th anniversary this year. The opportunity to showcase our "library of the future" in Ottawa South was a wonderful finale as I concluded my one-year term as the President of the CLA.



The theme of the conference was "Libraries Build Community". Keynote speakers Avi and Stephen Lewis and Cate McNeely were inspiring and entertaining and the dozens of OPL staff who volunteered helped make it a great success. The OPL organized an impressive booth at the CLA trade show and many of our staff gave presentations and participated in a variety of programs. Our Board of Trustees hosted a wonderful reception for more than 40 visiting trustees and other dignitaries and the Friends of the OPL Association (FOPLA) sponsored an ice-cream break for delegates in conjunction with the Friends of the Edmonton Public Library.

On the last day of the conference CLA delegates were invited to renew their citizenship vows at a ceremony for 37 new Canadians in the adjacent room to the annual general meeting. For many it was one of the emotional highlights of the conference since the citizenship judge was OPL's good friend Suzanne Pinel, known as "Marie Soleil" to many. The conference helped celebrate OPL's 100th birthday and the 100th centennial of the CNIB Library Service to the Blind. Many in the audience were moved to tears at the closing ceremonies as award winning, east-coast singer/song writer Terry Kelly, who is blind, debuted a new song called "That All May Read". This song will be available to the whole Canadian library community to use in their activities and outreach.

Delegates were very impressed with our beautiful city, with the programs and services of OPL and of course with our new Greenboro District Library. But most of all they were impressed with the warmth of the welcome they received from staff and citizens alike. For all that, I express my thanks.

Message de la bibliothécaire municipale

L'anticipation s'est transformée en jubilation cet été quand la Bibliothèque publique d'Ottawa a célébré l'ouverture de la spectaculaire Bibliothèque du secteur Greenboro, tout en accueillant avec grand succès la conférence et le salon professionnel de la Canadian Library Association (CLA) en juin.

Nous avons souhaité la bienvenue à 1 150 délégués de partout au Canada, aux É.-U.-A. et au R.-U. à notre belle ville pendant la célébration du 100^e anniversaire de la BPO cette année. La possibilité de faire connaître notre « bibliothèque de l'avenir », située dans Ottawa-Sud, est venue marquer la fin de mon mandat d'un an à titre de présidente de la CLA.

Le congrès s'est tenu sur le thème « Les bibliothèques bâtissent les communautés ». Avi et Stephen Lewis ainsi que Cate McNeely, orateurs principaux, ont été inspirants et divertissants. Des douzaines de membres du personnel de la BPO qui ont fourni de l'aide bénévole ont contribué au grand succès de la conférence. La BPO a érigé un stand imposant au salon professionnel de la CLA et un grand nombre de nos employés ont fait des présentations et participé à divers programmes. Notre Conseil d'administration a offert une magnifique réception pour plus de quarante administrateurs, administratrices de l'extérieur ainsi que d'autres dignitaires. L'Association des amis de la BPO (AABPO), en collaboration avec les Amis de la Bibliothèque publique d'Edmonton, a offert une pause-crème glacée aux délégués.

Au dernier jour du congrès, les délégués de la CLA ont été invités à renouveler leur serment de citoyenneté dans le cadre d'une cérémonie organisée pour 37 nouveaux Canadiens dans une salle adjacente à celle où se tenait l'assemblée générale annuelle. L'occasion s'est avérée un moment-phare de la conférence pour de nombreuses personnes car, entre autres, la juge de la citoyenneté n'était nulle autre que la bonne amie de la BPO, Suzanne Pinel, connue par plusieurs sous le nom de « Marie Soleil ». Le congrès a contribué aux célébrations du 100^e anniversaire de la BPO et au centenaire de la Bibliothèque de l'INCA pour personnes aveugles. Beaucoup de personnes dans l'auditoire étaient au bord des larmes lors des cérémonies de clôture quand le chanteur/compositeur aveugle primé de la côte Est, Terry Kelly, a chanté pour la première fois « That All May Read ». La chanson sera mise à la disposition de tout le milieu canadien des bibliothèques qui pourra l'utiliser dans ses activités régulières et de diffusion externe.

Notre belle ville, les programmes et les services de la BPO et, bien entendu, notre nouvelle Bibliothèque du secteur Greenboro ont fortement impressionnés les délégués. Mais ils ont surtout été touchés par le chaleureux accueil que leur ont réservé tant le personnel que les citoyens. Je vous en remercie.

Board Highlights

- **New Member:** The OPL Board welcomed new trustee Elaine Taylor at the May meeting. Ms Taylor has been a trustee in the pre-amalgamated OPL and brings both experience and a new perspective to OPL's governing body.
- **Long Range Financial Plan:** At a meeting held at the end of June, the Board approved its submission to the City's 10-year Long Range Financial Plan (3). It includes proposals to implement the Board's "Libraries for Ottawa" strategy through improvements to local branches and the development of a new central library. The Board's submission asks for an additional \$1 million/year to maintain, enhance and expand neighbourhood branches, plus funding to plan for and begin construction of a new central library the site for which has yet to be chosen. External fundraising is part of the financing plan for this major project.
- **Greenboro:** After consultation with the community, the Board selected the name "Greenboro District Library" for the newly opened south end branch on Lorry Greenberg Drive. The Board also hosted the official opening of the library on June 7 with his worship Mayor Bob Chiarelli presiding.
- **Strategic Plan:** The Board continued the development of its multi-year strategic plan by holding a visioning exercise in early June. This work resulted in a preliminary vision statement which will be refined and integrated with strategic goals in the fall.
- **Canadian Library Association:** In June the Board welcomed 1200 delegates of the Canadian Library Association to Ottawa. Board members attended a broad range of sessions and hosted library trustees from across the country.

Faits saillants du Conseil

- **Nouveau membre :** Le Conseil d'administration a accueilli un nouveau membre à l'occasion de sa réunion de mai en la personne de Elaine Taylor. Administratrice de la BPO avant la fusion, M^{me} Taylor apporte à la fois de l'expérience et une nouvelle perspective à l'organe dirigeant de la BPO.
- **Plan financier à long terme :** Dans le cadre d'une réunion tenue fin juin, le Conseil a approuvé sa présentation budgétaire concernant le Plan financier décennal à long terme de la Ville (3). Elle contient des propositions pour appliquer la stratégie « Bibliothèques pour Ottawa » du Conseil d'administration par le biais d'améliorations apportées aux succursales et de l'établissement d'une nouvelle Bibliothèque centrale. Dans sa présentation, le Conseil demande un montant additionnel d'un million de dollars par année pour contribuer au maintien, à l'amélioration et à l'expansion des succursales de quartier, ainsi que du financement pour planifier et construire une nouvelle Bibliothèque centrale sur un site à déterminer. La collecte de fonds externe fait partie du plan de financement de ce grand projet.
- **Greenboro :** Après avoir consulté la communauté, le Conseil a choisi le nom de « Bibliothèque du secteur Greenboro » pour la nouvelle succursale du secteur sud sise sur la promenade Lorry Greenberg. Le Conseil a aussi organisé l'ouverture officielle de cette bibliothèque le 7 juin sous la présidence du maire Bob Chiarelli.
- **Plan stratégique :** Le Conseil a poursuivi l'élaboration de son plan stratégique pluriannuel en organisant une séance de visualisation début juin. La séance a permis de produire un énoncé de vision préliminaire qui sera peaufiné et intégré aux objectifs stratégiques à l'automne.
- **Canadian Library Association :** En juin, le Conseil a souhaité la bienvenue à 1 200 délégués à la conférence de la Canadian Library Association à Ottawa. Les membres du Conseil ont participé à une large gamme de séances et accueilli des administratrices et administrateurs de partout au pays.

A Library in Motion

A Library love story by Author Patricia Cook, North Vancouver

My first experience with a library happened during my sixth year. It certainly is not what you would experience today in this day and age with a library because ours came on wheels.

A library in motion caused me to question other peoples' notions.

My father was a fireman in the Armed Forces and we had been transferred to Downsview, Ottawa during the summer. My older sister Cathy and I were warily watching a group of kids play Red Rover, Red Rover when a big blue bus pulled up to the curb. The kids went nuts screaming and rushing towards it; pushing each other out of the line they were trying to form in front of its doors. Cathy and I had no idea what was going on and because we had plenty of experience being the "new kids on the block" we were sticking close to the safety of our home, so close in fact; that we wouldn't leave our doorstep. The doors to the bus opened and a few children at a time entered, when they came out they had books in their hands. Eventually a lady climbed off the bus and the kids began to sit in a circle, that was when she motioned for my sister and I to come over.

We felt safer with an adult around so after a little whispered discussion it was decided we'd creep closer. The lady began to read us Curious George, changing her voice from character to character and showing us the pictures as she read. That was the first time I believe we had ever been read to. Sure we had picture books but neither of us could read so this was quite a treat and we were enthralled with this monkey. After the story we were taken on the bus and our shock deepened, we had no idea what a library was and to see all those books, it was really mind-boggling. The man made us special cards with our names and addresses on it - 152 Deniverville Drive - I still remember. Those cards were left on the bus till the next week and this made us feel important and a part of something magical...

Une bibliothèque itinérante

Une histoire d'amour avec la bibliothèque par l'auteure Patricia Cook, Vancouver Nord

Ma première expérience avec la bibliothèque est survenue quand j'avais six ans. Ce n'est sûrement pas ce qui se passerait de nos jours dans une bibliothèque parce que la nôtre avait des roues.

Une bibliothèque itinérante m'a amenée à me poser des questions sur les notions d'autres personnes.

Mon père était pompier dans les forces armées et nous avons été mutés à Downsview, Ottawa pendant l'été. Ma soeur aînée Cathy et moi regardions avec lassitude un groupe d'enfants jouer à Red Rover, Red Rover quand un gros autobus bleu s'est amené. Les enfants tout excités se sont rués vers lui, se poussant l'un l'autre hors de la ligne qu'ils tentaient de former en avant de ses portes. Cathy et moi n'avions aucune idée de ce qui se passait. Comme nous avions plein d'expérience en tant que « nouveaux enfants dans le quartier », nous restions tout près de notre maison, en sécurité, si près en fait que nous n'en quitions pas le seuil. Les portes de l'autobus se sont ouvertes et les enfants sont entrés, quelques-uns à la fois. Ils en sont ressortis avec des livres. Finalement, une femme est sortie de l'autobus et les enfants se sont assis en cercle. C'est à ce moment qu'elle nous a fait signe de venir.

Rassurées par la présence d'une adulte, nous avons décidé de nous approcher lentement après en avoir discuté à voix basse. La dame a commencé à nous lire Curious George, changeant sa voix d'un personnage à l'autre et nous montrant les images au fur à mesure. Je crois que c'était la première fois qu'on nous lisait quelque chose. Nous avions bien sûr des livres d'images mais ni l'une ni l'autre d'entre nous ne savait lire et nous étions fascinées par ce singe. Après le conte, on nous a fait monter dans l'autobus et notre choc fut encore plus grand, car nous n'avions aucune idée de ce qu'était une bibliothèque. Voir tous ces livres était vraiment époustoufflant. L'homme nous a préparé des cartes spéciales avec notre nom et adresse - 152, promenade Deniverville - je m'en rappelle encore. Ces cartes furent laissées dans l'autobus jusqu'à la semaine suivante. Nous nous sommes senties importantes et comme faisant partie de quelque chose de magique...

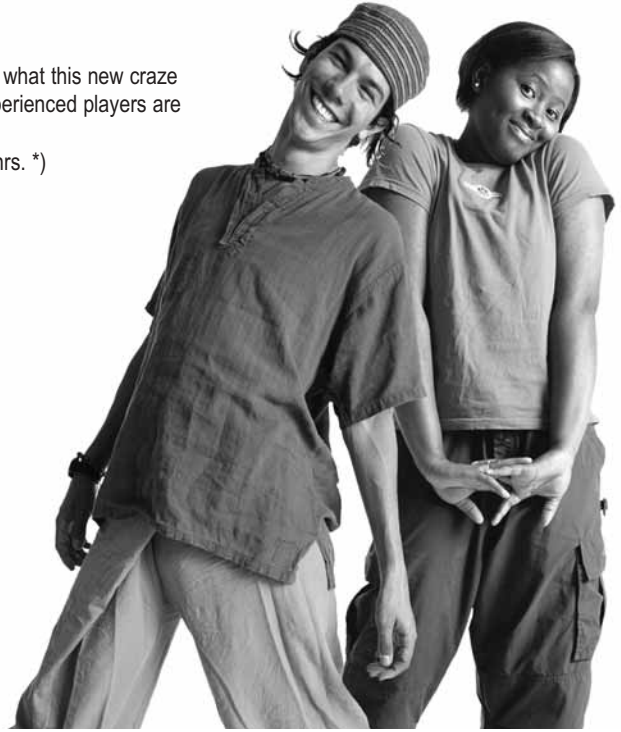

Looking for good books and great bargains? Want to support the library as well?

Friends now operate five bookshops and three self-serve bookshelves year-round in OPL branches. We also have our annual Mammoth Book Sale in April and are now planning the 100th Birthday Book Bash on Friday, Sep 15 on the Sparks Street Mall, in celebration of the OPL's centennial year.

In the past year FOPLA has grown by one new Bookshop and three new, self-serve, sales operations that are bound to please. In fact, these operations are doing so well there are plans to open more bookshops, all to provide patrons with the same low-cost books, while supporting the local library.

Our latest Bookstore-coffee shop - By The Book - is located in the hallway between the Greenboro Community Centre and the new Greenboro District Library. The shop is only about 100 square feet, our coziest Bookstore, and displays about 1,500 books. The coffee shop offers Fair Trade coffee or tea along with peanut-free snacks, pure fruit juices, and of course, Friends.

The Greenboro Community Centre also has a peanut-free policy. There are many people with deadly peanut allergies; children are particularly vulnerable and the Friends follow the policy to ensure the safety and comfort of our patrons.

Another part of Friends' social awareness is the desire to sell fair-trade, shade-grown and organic tea and coffee. Fair Trade means the coffee beans come from democratically organized cooperatives of small producers where the minimum price paid reflects the value of farm labour. There is no child labour and farmers and workers are paid fairly.

By The Book is managed by the Greenboro Local Committee of the Friends with a management team of Susan Shvets, Yvonne Avis, Joan Dewis, Edwina Morris, Maureen Strong, Heather McRae and 53 volunteers.

The self-serve bookshelves are located at three branches in the east end of Ottawa. Customers simply select books they wish to purchase from the shelves and spinners marked "For Sale" and pay for them at the circulation desk. Friends are

responsible for collecting, sorting, and shelving the donated books and payments are collected by library staff during regular branch hours.

Still looking for a bargain? FOPLA will host a special 100th Birthday Book Bash on the Sparks Street Mall sponsored by CBC. This big book sale with bargain prices will take place on Friday, Sep 15, between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. We expect to have a party atmosphere where you can buy back some of the books you or others have donated to help celebrate the 100th Anniversary of the OPL. If the weather doesn't cooperate we will simply move inside the CBC to Studio 40.

Les Amis dirigent maintenant cinq librairies et trois rayons de livres libre-service, à longueur d'année, dans les succursales de la Bibliothèque publique d'Ottawa. Nous avons aussi organisé notre Solde gigantesque de livres usagés et planifions maintenant la Profusion de livres du 100^e anniversaire qui se tiendra le vendredi 15 sept. sur le mail de la rue Sparks pour célébrer le centenaire de la BPO.

Au cours de la dernière année, l'AABPO a élargi ses services grâce à l'ouverture d'une nouvelle librairie et de trois espaces à rayons libre-service, des initiatives qui plairont sûrement. En fait, tout va si bien que des plans sont en cours pour l'ouverture d'autres librairies afin d'offrir aux usagers des livres à faible coût, tout en appuyant la bibliothèque locale.

Notre toute dernière librairie-café – À vos livres – est située dans le corridor entre le Centre communautaire Greenboro et la nouvelle Bibliothèque du secteur Greenboro. D'une superficie d'environ 100 pieds carrés et abritant quelque 1 500 livres, À vos livres est la plus confortable de nos librairies. À vos livres est dirigée par le comité local des Amis de Greenboro, appuyé par une équipe de gestion formée de Susan Shvets, Yvonne Avis, Joan Dewis, Edwina Morris, Maureen Strong et Heather McRae ainsi que 53 bénévoles.

Les rayons libre-service se trouvent dans trois succursales du secteur est d'Ottawa. La clientèle choisit simplement les livres qu'elle désire acheter dans les rayons ou les présentoirs rotatifs portant l'enseigne « À vendre » et les paie au comptoir du

prêt. Les Amis s'occupent de collecter, de trier et de placer les livres donnés sur les rayons, tandis que le personnel de la bibliothèque reçoit les paiements pendant les heures normales d'ouverture de la succursale.

"By encouraging youth to reach out for knowledge, the Ottawa Public Library is helping prepare our next space generation," said Canadian Space Agency astronaut Steve MacLean during his first year as Campaign Chair for the Every Kid a Card Campaign in 2004. Steve MacLean and campaign sponsors including Staples Business Depot, Pizza Pizza and the Ottawa 67's Hockey Team have helped make the annual campaign a growing success. In 2004 more than 4,700 kids participated and in 2005 there were more than 7,100 kids who renewed or signed up for an OPL card.

The “library of the future” gets new name at the official opening

The OPL Board’s decision to name the new district library “Greenboro” was announced by Board Chair Rick Chiarelli at its official opening ceremony on June 20. Greenboro received about two-thirds of the 700 votes from the public compared to about 100 votes each for “Hunt Club” and “South Central”.

Mayor Bob Chiarelli joined City Councillors Rick Chiarelli and Diane Deans to celebrate the official opening of the \$7.7 million district library, adjacent to the Greenboro Community Centre in Ottawa South. The two-storey, 29-thousand-square-foot “library of the future” brings enhanced library service to 150,000 residents in South Ottawa with an opening day collection of 115,000 items.

“The new library has something for everyone. And with its wide array of features and resources, it will ensure excellent service for all ages and interests,” said Mayor Chiarelli. “Community input during planning and development, combined with the hard work of library and city staff, has produced an excellent facility -- on budget and on time,” he added.

“The much-anticipated district library is a wonderful highlight to our 100th anniversary celebrations this year and to begin the next 100 years of quality library service in Ottawa,” said Councillor Chiarelli. “With wireless Internet, convenient self-checkout, a drive-thru book return, a teen room designed with input from a teen advisory group, a contemporary work of public art, and many other features in an attractive environment with contemporary styling, this is truly the library of the future”.

The project included funding for an indoor link to the Greenboro Community Centre with space for a used-book shop operated by the Friends of the Ottawa Public Library Association (FOPLA).

“Today’s opening is the realization of a dream, twelve years in the making,” said OPL Board Trustee and City Councillor for Gloucester-Southgate, Diane Deans. “Our community and many of its members have worked incredibly hard on this project and deserve to celebrate this new focal point for our community”.

The library began operations on June 7 following the relocation of equipment and material from the

Blossom Park branch. Development of a district library in Ottawa South is an integral part of the OPL’s long-term service-delivery strategy featuring a system of community branches complemented by a main downtown library and larger, district libraries in the east, south and west of the city.

Le nom de la « bibliothèque de l'avenir » est dévoilé lors de l'ouverture officielle

La décision du Conseil d'administration de la BPO de baptiser la nouvelle Bibliothèque du secteur Greenboro a été annoncée par le président du Conseil, Rick Chiarelli, à l'occasion de l'ouverture officielle le 20 juin. Ce nom a reçu environ les deux tiers des 700 votes exprimés par le public, contre 100 votes chacun pour « Hunt Club » et « Centre-Sud ».

Le maire, M. Bob Chiarelli, s'est joint aux conseillers municipaux Rick Chiarelli et Diane Deans, pour l'ouverture officielle de la Bibliothèque du secteur Greenboro, évaluée à 7,7 millions de dollars, adjacente au centre communautaire Greenboro et situé dans Ottawa-Sud. Cette « bibliothèque de l'avenir », de deux étages et d'une superficie de 29 000 pieds carrés, permettra d'améliorer les services de bibliothèque offerts aux 150 000 résidents d'Ottawa-Sud, avec une collection de 115 000 documents dès l'ouverture.

« Cette nouvelle bibliothèque a quelque chose à offrir à chacun d'entre vous. Ses nombreuses caractéristiques et ressources permettront de fournir d'excellents services aux personnes de tous les âges et pour tous les intérêts, a affirmé le maire. La consultation auprès de la collectivité pendant la planification et le développement, conjugué au travail acharné du personnel de la bibliothèque et de la ville, dont le respect du budget et de l'échéancier, ont abouti à un établissement remarquable. »

Pour sa part, le conseiller Chiarelli, président du Conseil d'administration de la Bibliothèque publique d'Ottawa, a déclaré que : « La très attendue bibliothèque de secteur représente un point saillant de nos célébrations du 100^e anniversaire, qui se dérouleront cette année, ainsi qu'un début prometteur pour des services de bibliothèque de qualité pour les 100 prochaines années à Ottawa. Offrant des services Internet sans fil, une consultation libre-service efficace, un service au volant pour le retour des livres, une salle destinée aux adolescents conçue par un groupe consultatif formé d'adolescents, des activités contemporaines d'art civique et de nombreuses autres caractéristiques figurant dans un environnement attrayant et moderne, cette bibliothèque représente réellement l'avenir ».

Le projet comprend le financement pour un passage intérieur au centre communautaire Greenboro, ainsi qu'un endroit destiné à une boutique de livres usagés qui sera exploitée par l'Association des amis de la Bibliothèque publique d'Ottawa (AABPO).

« L'inauguration d'aujourd'hui est la réalisation d'un rêve, qui aura pris douze ans à se concrétiser, affirme Diane Deans, membre du Conseil d'administration de la Bibliothèque publique d'Ottawa et conseillère municipale pour Gloucester-Southgate. Elle ajoute : Notre communauté et beaucoup de ses membres ont travaillé très fort à ce projet et ils méritent de célébrer ce nouveau pôle d'attraction pour notre communauté. »

La bibliothèque a ouvert ses portes au grand public le 7 juin après avoir déplacé l'équipement et le matériel de la succursale Blossom Park. L'établissement d'une bibliothèque de secteur dans Ottawa-Sud fait partie intégrante de la stratégie de prestation de services à long terme de la Bibliothèque publique d'Ottawa, comprenant un réseau de succursales communautaires complété par une bibliothèque centrale située au centre-ville et des bibliothèques de secteur plus vastes situées à l'est, au sud et à l'ouest de la Ville.

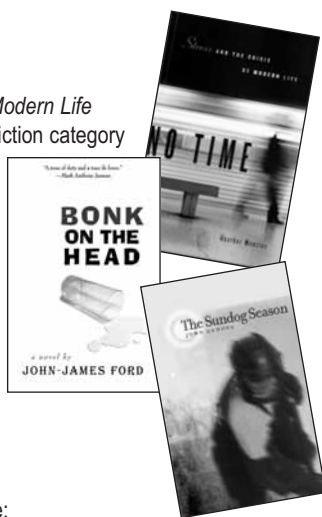
